FIRST READING

Apocalypse 11:19, 12:1-6, 10

The sanctuary of God in heaven opened and the ark of the covenant could be seen inside it.

Now a great sign appeared in heaven: a woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the moon, and with the twelve stars on her head for a crown. She was pregnant, and in labour, crying aloud in the pangs of childbirth. Then a second sign appeared in the sky, a huge red dragon which had seven heads and ten horns, and each of the seven heads crowned with a coronet. Its tail dragged a third of the stars from the sky and dropped them to the earth, and the dragon stopped in front of the woman as she was having the child, so that he could eat it as soon as it was born from its mother. The woman brought a male child into the world, the son who was to rule all the nations with an iron sceptre, and the child was taken straight up to God and to his throne, while the woman escaped into the desert, where God had made a place of safety ready.

Then I heard a voice shout from heaven, 'Victory and power and empire for ever have been won by our God, and all authority for his Christ.'

BEREAVEMENT DURING COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted every aspect of life, including how we die and how we grieve.


Each year, at least 44,000 Australians will develop chronic and debilitating mental health impairments following the death of a family member or a close friend.

Bereavement during the COVID-19 pandemic, whether attributable to the virus or not, presents additional significant risk factors for poor mental health due to public health measures such as physical distancing, travel restrictions, visitor limitations and reduced physical contact. Currently, little is known about the mental health effects and support needs of people bereaved during and following global crises, such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

To address this significant gap, researchers at the University of Technology Sydney are undertaking a National COVID-19 Bereavement Project, funded by the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF). This research will track the mental health outcomes and service needs of over 2,000 Australians bereaved from any cause during 2020/2021.

ASSURE THE VICTORY

Yes, the Olympics can become very nationalistic. Yes, perhaps the games promote an unhealthy level of competition. But there is no denying that the Olympic Games carry some very dramatic images. When the top three Olympians in an event stand on the podium and their countries' flags are raised, with the winning one above the other two as their national anthem is being played, it can truly be a special moment, a wonderful symbol of an athlete rising above others in the quest for success and victory. Remember the 1980 Australian hockey team and the chant "Australia" and the cry, "Do you believe in miracles?"

The feast of the Assumption of Mary should elicit the same sort of intuitive



response from us. Mary literally rises above us as a symbol of victory - victory over sin, victory over death, victory brought about by an uncompromising faith. Mary's faith saw her through the conception and birth of her son, through Jesus' death and resurrection, to her sharing in the fire of the Holy Spirit.

What happened to her later in her life is not recorded. But she probably did not just wait to die. More likely, she preached and told stories and quoted her son. She probably gave comfort and hope to those who believed in him while continually rising above all that was happening around her.

The Commissioning:

Can we leave this time of worship without a prayer for peace? Can we leave this time of worship without a resolution to serve our neighbour? Can we leave this time of worship without a commitment to our friends in the faith community? Can we leave this place of worship without a pledge to forgive those who have hurt us most? Can we leave this place of worship without the determination to bring light to the dark places? Can we leave this place of worship, without heartfelt thanks to God who has given us everything? COMPLIANCE WITH COVID-19 REGULATIONS

(Current from 12 August, 2021)

- The density requirement has changed to 3 people per 4 sqm. Weddings and funerals are capped at 50 people (provided density requirements are met).
- Wearing of masks is mandatory for indoor places. Wearing of masks is strongly recommended for Parish Offices.
- Choirs and congregational singing are not permitted. A single distanced singer is permitted.
- Recommendation from Archdiocesan Office that tea/coffee after Mass be suspended.
- Social distancing is mandatory - DO NOT CONGREGATE at entry/exit and outside.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.
- Every gathering must record contact details - either with the QR code for smart phones, or the handwritten log - both located at the entrance to the Church.
- Hand sanitizer is available at Church entrances.
- Offertory procession will be omitted. Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- Collection plates will not be passed around, but a single drop point is provided at the churches.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- Care should be taken at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.
- The Archdiocese recommends Covid vaccination for all (please check with your GP if you have concerns).

Spirit. She gave a loud cry and said, 'Of all women you are the most blessed, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Why should I be honoured with a visit from the mother of my Lord? For the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leapt for joy. Yes, blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled.'

And Mary said:

'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my saviour; because he has looked upon his lowly handmaid. Yes, from this day forward all generations will call me blessed, for the Almighty has done great things for me. Holy is his name, and his mercy reaches from age to age for those who fear him. He has shown the power of his arm, he has routed the proud of heart. He has pulled down princes from their thrones and exalted the lowly. The hungry he has filled with good things, the rich sent empty away. He has come to the help of Israel his servant, mindful of his mercy - according to the promise he made to our ancestors - of his mercy to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

Mary stayed with Elizabeth about three months and then went back home.

I KISS YOUR MOTHER

"Ljubi Maiku!" is a delightful Bosnian expression "I kiss your mother!" (Ljubi maiku!) Bosnian fathers use to praise their children. It means "I kiss your mother because you are such a wonderful child!" or, in other words, "My compliments to your mother!" It's similar to the praise Jesus received by those awed by his ministry: "Blessed is the womb that carried you!"

Mothers often receive praise for the accomplishments of their children; their children's successes and places in society reflects well on their parenting skills. But many mothers - and fathers, too - make the mistake of seeing their self-worth entirely in terms of how well their children do. This holds true particularly in societies where women have little say except when it comes to caring for

their children. If a son or daughter succeeds, the mother has proved herself valuable to society and worthy of respect. If her children fail, then she, too, is looked upon as a failure.

If Mary, the mother of Jesus, saw her self-worth solely tied into the accomplishments of her son, she would have a mighty large ego - the man saved the world, after all. But Mary had a much deeper and more inspiring understanding of her purpose.

So, we set aside time this week to commemorate Mary's life on earth and in heaven. In the process we find ourselves wondering how available we've been for God's work in the past year. Have we called on Christ when we needed him and pointed others the way to Jesus, just as Mary did at the wedding of Cana when she asked for Jesus' assistance and said to the servants: "Do whatever he tells you?"


