

FIRST READING

Acts 14:21-27

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.


SCAM EMAIL

SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S HISTORY FESTIVAL

PADDY'S ROW

(Ref: "Willunga Now and Then")
In the 19th century, the western side of Adey Road between Flour Mill Road and Little Road in White's Valley, Aldinga, was commonly known as "Paddy's Row" because of the number of people from Ireland who lived there.

At least four Irish Catholic labourers and their families lived in "Paddy's Row" from the late 1850s. They comprised two pairs of brothers from Kilkenny in Ireland who were related by marriage – the Cantwells and the Hobans - Patrick Cantwell, his younger brother, James, and their sister, Mary, and Michael Hoban and his younger brother, Daniel, who married Mary Cantwell at St Joseph's in Willunga in 1857. All the families had children - at least twenty-four in total.

They had all arrived in South Australia between 1855 and 1858 and were all parishioners of St Joseph's in Willunga. Some married at St Joseph's, many of their children were baptised there and some are buried in the St Joseph's cemetery.

Daniel Hoban was resident in Paddy's Row before 1867. He was born in Ireland in about 1833 and arrived in South Australia, aged about 23 years. He was married at St Joseph's on 19 November 1857 to Mary Cantwell when they were both about 24 years old. Parish priest, Fr Peter Hughes, performed the ceremony. Both Daniel and Mary signed the Register with crosses, as they could not write their names. They had seven children. One son, Michael, married Mary Ann Gaffney, aged 21 years, at St Josephs Church on 3 March 1886.

Daniel was an agricultural laborer. He entered the Annual Willunga Ploughing Matches in 1857, 1858 and 1859 as a ploughman driving horse teams. He was described as a contractor in 1868-9 and worked on the roads for the Aldinga Council in 1869. In 1871 he became insolvent.

Both Hoban brothers lived in Paddy's Row until their early deaths. Michael Hoban died, aged 33 years, in

February 1860, and was buried in an unmarked grave in St Joseph's cemetery. By June 1860, his widow, Mary Ann, and three young children had become reliant on Destitute Board rations

Daniel died at Aldinga on 18 May 1879, aged 44 years. He was buried in St Joseph's Cemetery and has a slate headstone. Mary died on 10 March 1898.

Patrick Cantwell was the older brother of James and Mary Cantwell. Patrick and his wife, Ann (nee Quirk), had at least three children. Patrick died in 1881 at Aldinga and his wife, Ann, died in 1887. She is buried at St Joseph's Cemetery.

James Cantwell and his wife Mary had eleven children, six of whom were born at Aldinga between 1858 and 1871. He was a labourer and the

COMPLIANCE WITH COVID-19 REGULATIONS

(Current from 10/05/22)



- If you have tested positive for COVID-19, please follow the SA Health instructions in regard to isolating and other government health protocols. Stay home and do not attend church services until you have fully recovered.
- There are now no density limits for places of worship.
- Masks are highly recommended by the Archdiocese.
- Attendees at indoor religious services may sing during worship.
- Please keep in mind the importance of social distancing and good hygiene practices.
- Hand sanitizer is available at Church entrances.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during Mass.
- Offertory procession will be omitted. Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- Collection plates will not be passed around.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- The Archdiocese recommends Covid vaccinations for all (please check with your GP if you have concerns).

DID YOU KNOW?

- The title 'Son of Man' is one that is often used by Jesus in the gospels to describe himself.
- In the Gospel of John, when Jesus speaks of being glorified or exalted, he is referring to his death on the cross. For John, this is the moment of supreme triumph for Jesus.
- This text comes from a section of John's Gospel known as the Farewell Discourse, which is delivered by Jesus to his friends just before his arrest. Here, Judas has already gone out to betray him.

GOSPEL

John 13:31-35

When Judas had gone Jesus said:

'Now has the Son of Man been glorified, and in him God has been glorified.

If God has been glorified in him, God will in turn glorify him in himself, and will glorify him very soon.

'My little children, I shall not be with you much longer.

I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another.

By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

John's Gospel does not present a sentimental view of love. This is a type of love that is shown in service and sacrifice. It is difficult to choose to love when faced with hatred and anger. Jesus tells the disciples that all will know that they are his disciples because of the love they show for one another. This description of the early Christian community will be repeated in the Acts of the Apostles: "See how they love one another." Christian love is the hallmark of Christianity. We see it lived in the witness of the martyrs. We see it in the example of the lives of the saints. We see it in the holy women and men who live and love daily, making small and large sacrifices for others. Loyola Press


ALL THINGS NEW

One of my favourite movie moments occurs when in The Christmas Carol when Ebenezer Scrooge throws open his shutters on Christmas morning and looks out on the world with new eyes. His latenight encounters with the ghosts of Christmas past, present, and future had shaken his preconceived notions about what to value in life. After years of bitterness and hoarding, his heart was newly open and all the

world was wonderful. No matter the season, I always think about Scrooge when I read the passage from the Book of Revelation, "Behold, I make all things new". When Scrooge awoke from his dream, nothing external in his life had changed. But because he had a change of heart, everything around him took on new meaning. Scrooge personifies the promise that all things can be made new.

How? Jesus offers a sure-fire way to experience a radical reorientation in our lives. "Love one another," he says. If you feel as if your life is in a rut, take Jesus' advice to heart. Look around you and respond to those you see with loving care. For when we view the world with the eyes of love and generosity, we will surely recognise all the love and generosity that has been showered on us. And rather than experiencing life as a land of want and deprivation, we will be spending our days in the land of abundance. And that's when all things will be made new.
