FIRST READING

Acts 1:1-11

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. ‘It is’ he had said ‘what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.’

Now having met together, they asked him, ‘Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom of Israel?’ He replied, ‘It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.’

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were

still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, ‘Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.’

SECOND READING

Ephesians 1:17-23

May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a spirit of wisdom and perception of what is revealed, to bring you to full knowledge of him. May he enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named not only in this age but also in the age to come.

MAY IS HISTORY MONTH

St Joseph's Presbytery, Willunga

Early in 1848, when Father O'Brien was appointed the first priest in charge of Willunga, there was no presbytery and he lived at Morphett Vale with Fr Snell. Later, Bishop Murphy bought four acres of heavily timbered land, part of which is now the St Joseph's precinct in Willunga and a small cabin was erected there for the priest.

St Joseph's first resident priest, Fr Caldwell, remembered his arrival in 1850 to this Presbytery that was a lean-to [sic] consisting of 2 rooms, unplastered and the roof leaking. The ground was full of holes. The first thing I did was to persuade the Congregation to build a cottage for my servant. I went to the Bishop and said that if he would give me £5 I would build a cottage. He laughed at the extravagant amount but gave it to me and I bought some windows and built the chimney with it and Logan, Houghy and Finke built me the cottage. Afterwards, myself and my old man Tom connected it to my rooms with a verandah, plastered the rooms, built a wooden stable, made a garden, in a word worked as hard as Robinson Crusoe and his man Friday.¹ Caldwell also reported that government aid of \$50 was gained. He moved in to this presbytery on 10 May 1850 and they began to build the stable on May 18th.

In the mid 1890s, after energetic fund raising across the parish from concerts, lectures, race meetings and stalls, the presbytery and church underwent major repairs. The Southern Cross reported on the third concert held in aid of the presbytery repairs, held at Yankalilla: ...knowing the people so well, I felt sure it would be a success. Well, I am very pleased to be able to say that the result far and away exceeded expectations. After paying all expenses, the sum of £16/10 was handed over to the Treasurer; a sum more than double the amount realized at the concerts at Willunga and Morphett Vale. Of the concert, although not present, I am informed on excellent authority that it was the best of its kind ever given at Yankalilla.²

In August 1919, advertisements were placed in the newspapers for tenders for the addition of the four front rooms of the presbytery. Once again, the parishioners from Normanville, Willunga and Morphett Vale launched a series of fund raising events and working bees to alleviate the cost of this work. Photos also show that the large verandah was built at the same time, with wide steps leading down from the front door. The 'new' Presbytery was opened on Sunday November 14, 1920 when Fr Fahey was the parish priest of Willunga, Morphett Vale and Yankalilla.

From 1945, leading up to the Parish Centenary in May 1950, the presbytery and the church were further altered and upgraded. All roads led to Willunga on Sunday last for the celebration of the centenary of St. Joseph's Church. The recently renovated church—a striking picture, flanked on one side by the presbytery gardens, and on the other by tombstones over the graves of the early parishioners—brought many memories to the hearts of those present.³



COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS

(May, 2021)

Different rules apply for Churches with fixed or non-fixed seating. Please check with your Church for details on how seating is handled.

- For fixed seating 100% of available seats may be used, provided 100% of attendees wear masks. If 75% of seats are used, masks are not necessary.
- The non-fixed seating capacity is worked on 3:4sqm. No masks are required for this density. Masks are essential for anything more than the capped density.
- Singing as a congregation may recommence, provided masks are worn.
- No beverage or food consumption (ie cup of tea after Mass)
- Social distancing is still recommended.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.
- Every gathering must record contact details - either with the QR code for smart phones, or the handwritten log - both located at the entrance to the Church.
- Hand sanitizer is to be available at church entrances.
- Offertory procession will be omitted. Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed
- Collection plates will not be passed around but a single drop point is provided at the churches.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- Care should be taken at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.
- The obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity HAS NOT BEEN RE-INVOKED at this stage.

He has put all things under his feet and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Mt 28:19, 20

Alleluia, alleluia!

Go and teach all people my gospel. I am with you always, until the end of the world. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Mark 16:15-20

Jesus showed himself to the Eleven, and said to them: ‘Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation. He who believes and is baptised will be saved; he who does not believe will be condemned. These are the signs that will be associated with believers: in my name they will cast out devils; they will have the gift of tongues; they will pick up snakes in their hands, and be unharmed should they drink deadly poison; they will lay their hands on the sick, who will recover.’

And so the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven: there at the right hand of God he took his place, while they, going out, preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word by the signs that accompanied it.

SHARING THE TRADITION

The Ascension is not the celebration of a physical journey into the skies or the clouds, even though religious art often portrays this event in that way. The celebration of the Ascension of the Lord developed in the early Church to mark the fact that there was a period when Jesus of Nazareth was physically present and a subsequent period when he was no longer present in the same way. Heaven is often portrayed as a ‘place’ in the skies, but this can diminish the Christian understanding of heaven.

Heaven is the ultimate end and fulfilment of the deepest human longings, the state of supreme, definitive happiness ... This mystery of blessed communion with God and all who are in Christ is beyond all understanding and description.

Heaven is fully participating in the life of God. It is our ultimate destiny. St Augustine said, ‘Our lives are restless until they find rest in God.’

DID YOU KNOW

- These final verses of Mark’s Gospel were a later addition to the original ending of the women at the empty tomb. They show that from the earliest of times, the disciples realised that although Jesus was no longer physically present, ‘the Lord was working with them.’
- The word *apostle* comes from the Greek for ‘one who is sent out’.
- Mark uses the dramatic figures of speech about serpents and poisons to illustrate that those who believe in the Good News and preach it can overcome all that threatens or destroys life.
