


#### LOVE'S BAPTISMAL ROBE

At the beginning of every love, romantic or not, the dream for that love is connected to an ideal of purity, mutuality, and respect. In the early stages of love, that ideal is spontaneously respected.

In the stage of attraction, flirtation, infatuation, and the rooting of love in the poetic imagination, love generally enrobes itself, figuratively, in whiteness, in purity, in all that's best inside us. It has put on a baptismal robe because it senses that here, finally, it will be initiated into life.

There is nothing as potentially lifegiving and redeeming as falling in love. It re-colors the world completely. As the great novelist, Iris Murdoch once said: "The world can change in fifteen seconds, when you fall in love."

But the world, as we know, can also turn indifferent, dark, and angry in fifteen seconds, or fifteen years.

Time, familiarity, differences, congenital restlessness, old immaturities, wounded pride, a wandering eye, and simple human selfishness can soon enough begin to dispel the magic.

Where we once couldn't get enough of each other, swallowed our own hurts and pride for the other, and would willingly die for each other, we now begin to count our scars, let the days drift, and no longer search for the path towards the other's door.

All love eventually programs its own dark night of the soul, and this is healthy. When we first say the words, "I love you," and mean them, our hearts are connecting us to an ideal, a dream, a divine form, and a purity that draws energy from all that's best inside us.

But once we begin to compromise that ideal with any kind of disrespect whatsoever, then we begin the slide down a slippery slope and no expression of intimacy, the sexual bed included, will the redeem the initial dream for that love.

When we are baptized a white dress is put on us to symbolize purity and words are spoken over us to remind us that this white garment is the outward sign of our inner dignity and that we are meant to bring that dignity unstained into eternal life.

What's symbolized by our baptismal robes must be the poetic dream for every love. The challenge is always to bring the dignity of that love home Ronald Rolheiser unstained.





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**EXPLORING THE WORD** 

In the continuation of the discourse, Jesus' claim that he is the living bread come from heaven is brought to a new height. Not only has he surpassed the manna given by God in the desert, he now claims that it is his flesh and blood which gives life. For the Jews this is an abomination. The very strict dietary laws of Judaism precluded the eating of flesh with blood in it. Jesus' hearers again remain at the physical understanding of his words. They imagine some form of cannibalism and are outraged. 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' But Jesus is not deterred. He insists that he makes God known because he comes from God. Eating the flesh and drinking the blood of the Son of Man will bring those who believe to eternal life – not the physical life of this world but to life with the Father forever.

blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.'



# **GETTING IT**

The people in this week's gospel who just "don't get it" when Jesus tells them his flesh is the living bread from heaven remind me of a time we scared the daylights out of my much younger sister. She was just about 3 years old when she and her older sister were having trouble getting to sleep. They were in the same room and kept giggling and laughing long past their bedtime. Our parents were tired and the end of the day and getting exasperated. One of them whispered something and once again the giggling erupted uncontrollably.

In desperation, I yelled out, "It looks like we're going to have to separate you two." At that, my younger sister started wailing in terror. Mum and Dad went in to console her, but she cried all the more saying, "Don't separate me, don't separate me!" Earlier that day she'd been watching Mum separate a whole chicken into pieces for the barbecue grill and the image obviously stayed with her. She thought that's what we were threatening to do to her and her sister.

We sat with her and soothed her. We reassured her mummy and daddy might get mad but they would never do anything like that to hurt her. Comforted, the two little girls drifted off to sleep, and we learned a lesson about the trouble of taking things literally.

# DINNER AT WISDOM'S TABLE

Jesus continued, "I am the Bread – living Bread! – who came down out of heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live – and forever! The Bread that I present to the world so that it can eat and live is myself, this flesh-and-blood self."

Do a quick calculation of how many times you've received communion. If you're a cradle Catholic, and have been taking communion since the age of seven, that is, technically speaking, a LOT of communion. The numbers don't really matter, of course, but the habitual reception of communion does. What do we GET, exactly, when we get Eucharist?

The Church teaches that the bread and wine are Christ's Body and Blood. Transubstantiation is the million-dollar word for the event, but it's mostly helpful for theologians. Long before the invention of that word, table fellowship was shared among Christians. They understood that eating and drinking in memory of Jesus made them bearers of his life. They knew that sharing his supper also meant they shared his saving mission in the world. They believed that taking part in this meal was a commitment, a covenant in flesh and blood. This was serious business. To claim Jesus in this way meant that they might die for him.

Most of us in the receiving line at communion time will not be asked to die for Christ. But every one of us IS being asked to live for Christ. Are we in the right line, or aren't' we?

Bread is the food of life. Food is essential for our bodies to function. But food and drink also give pleasure and satisfaction. When people come together to celebrate, food and drink are part of the celebration. As food and drink are to the human person so Jesus is to those who believe in him.
