The 5CY Community Pantry is always grateful for the donations of non-perishable food-stuffs, personal hygiene items and cleaning materials. Boxes are in our Churches where people may place items. Donations can also be left at the Yankalilla District Council Office or the front foyer of the Yankalilla Area School.

If you would like to volunteer to assist with the 5CY Community Pantry or require further information, please contact the Peter Filsell (0427 534 095). Monetary donations are also welcome and can be made via Direct Debit to our account - Account name - 5CY Community Pantry, BSB - 105 092, Account No 0287 56440, Reference - your name.

Some examples of non-perishable items required for 5CY families: breakfast cereals, tinned vegetables (peas, peas and carrots, sweetcorn, mixed veg), tinned fruit, pasta (any style or shape), pasta sauce, packets instant pasta meals (eg Continental or

San Remo pouches) or rice meals, Maggi noodle cups (especially loved by children), baked beans, tinned spaghetti, muesli bars, small jars of vegemite, peanut butter and jams. small jars of instant coffee, small packets of tea, Milo or drinking chocolate, UHT milk, pancake mix, biscuits (both sweet and savory), dishwashing liquid (small size), washing powder (small packets), tissues.

Please make sure all non-perishable items have an extended "Use by" date. We appreciate your assistance with this, as our families need to be shown respect and dignity. We remind ourselves: "If we wouldn't eat it, why should they."

CITIZEN SCIENTISTS WANTED in Onkaparinga Council

Places are limited

If you are 60 years of age or over and regularly use the public spaces in the Onkaparinga Council then UniSA invites you to share your experiences to help co-design age friendly public spaces and neighbourhoods in order to better promote health and wellbeing, social engagement and engagement with the environment into the future.

Participation will involve:

- attendance at a series of three 2½ hour workshops, to be held at the

Onkaparinga Council offices on Friday 25 June, 2 July and 9 July

- a chance to trial the audit tool for 6 weeks – either on your smart phone or using a disposable camera and booklet that we provide
- a final workshop to discuss your experience and the results of the data collected with all citizen scientists on the team.



COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS

(June, 2021)

- Different rules apply for Churches with fixed or non-fixed seating. Please check with your Church for details on how seating is handled.

For fixed seating 100% of available seats may be used, provided 100% of attendees wear masks. If 75% of seats are used, masks are not necessary.

The non-fixed seating capacity is worked on 3:4sqm. No masks are required for this density. Masks are essential for anything more than the capped density.

- Singing as a congregation may recommence, provided masks are worn.
- Consumption of beverages (eg cuppa following Mass) and food may be resumed, provided Covid restrictions are strictly implemented. (Please ring the Parish Office for more details.)
- Social distancing is still recommended.
- There should be no shaking of hands or holding hands during the Mass.
- Every gathering must record contact details - either with the QR code for smart phones, or the handwritten log - both located at the entrance to the Church.
- Hand sanitizer is to be available at church entrances.
- Offertory procession will be omitted. Communion is given only in hands. Precious Blood will not be distributed.
- Collection plates will not be passed around but a single drop point is provided at the churches.
- Holy Water is not available at the doors of churches.
- All surfaces should be cleaned at least daily, with special attention given to frequently touched surfaces.
- Sick and high risk/vulnerable people should be encouraged not to attend.
- Care should be taken at the dismissal and on leaving the church to minimise social contact.
- The Archdiocese recommends Covid vaccination for all (please check with your GP if you have concerns).
- The obligation for Sunday Mass for the laity HAS NOT BEEN RE-INVOKED at this stage.

And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, ‘Quiet now! Be calm!’ And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, ‘Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?’ They were filled with awe and said to one another, ‘Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.’

WORLD REFUGEE DAY

20 June

World Refugee Day is an international day designated by the United Nations to honour refugees around the globe. It falls each year on June 20 and celebrates the strength and courage of people who have been forced to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution. World Refugee Day is an occasion to build empathy and understanding for their plight and to recognize their resilience in rebuilding their lives.

HE STILL CALMS STORMS

When I was a teen, people told me I was living the “best years of my life.” I’d like to find the guy who first came up with that. I’m not sure that person was ever a teen.

Sure, the teen years can bring loads of fun. But they also bring plenty of storms. One day may bring new friends and great times, while the next day might bring broken friendships and loneliness. You might have successes. But you might also feel more and more pressure to succeed. Some people are pretty popular but feel confused on the inside. Meanwhile, other people struggle to find one friend to accept them as they are.

Yep, for all the good times there are plenty of times when we feel like the Apostles in this week’s Gospel: cringing in the boat during a storm, calling out to Jesus, “Don’t you care?”

Many of the early Christians felt that way. Mark wrote his Gospel for a community of Christians who were facing persecution. This story reminded those early Christians that Jesus does care, even though it seemed at times like he had forgotten them.

Jesus calms storms today in many ways. He might send people to us when we reach out for help. He might fill our heart with peace when we pour out our troubles in prayer or go to Mass. He might send us to calm the storms others face as they go through tough times or face persecution for taking Christian stands.

But Jesus does calm storms today. Call out to him, and your clouds will part.

GPBS eNews

DID YOU KNOW?

- ‘The other side’ refers to the eastern shore of the Sea of Galilee. This was known as pagan territory, the region of the Decapolis or the ‘ten cities’, which were not part of the traditional lands of Israel.
- The Sea of Galilee was (and still is) notorious for storms, which could blow up very quickly and be tempestuous.
- In Genesis 1, God brought order to the watery chaos at creation purely through his command. Here, Jesus does the same simply by verbal command.
- In Mark’s Gospel, the disciples are often portrayed as missing the point and failing to recognise who Jesus is!
