

109TH WORLD DAY OF **MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES**

There are libraries of books written about different parenting strategies. One of the topics to consider is choice. Will the children be given options to choose between, or will that freedom come when they are older? Will the consequences of choices always be meted out fairly, or will parents be lenient under certain conditions? Each family will approach these questions differently, but in general parents hope their children will grow to make good choices that lead to good consequences.

As children of God, we have the freedom to choose to follow Jesus and to work for the 'vineyard' of the Gospel. However, God's 'parenting strategy' is a mystery. We cannot fathom the kindness and compassion of God, whose ways are not our ways, nor thoughts our thoughts.

The landowner in today's parable chooses to mete out the same rewards to each of his workers. Justice and fairness go beyond any human standards - there is forgiveness and generosity for all.



Yet in our human world, there are so many who face uncertainty, fear. poverty and distress. Sometimes their conditions call for tough choices in order to preserve life and wellbeing for individuals and families. In an ideal world, Pope Francis says, the "decision to migrate should always be free". In reality, many are forced to make choices that are not fair or safe. Like the workers in the vineyard, they take any option that is available.

As a community, we can choose not to judge, but to respond with the generosity of God. We can create spaces of human dignity and flourishing. We can provide welcome, hospitality and means to earn an income. We can support those who choose to return. Pope Francis says that "the chance to live in peace and with dignity is not yet a right, but must be seen as a shared responsibility".

As a Church, we are moving forwards together on a synodal journey. It is a rediscovery of listening to the Holy Spirit within our structures as we live the Gospel as a pilgrim people. We are called to make good choices that will lead to good consequences. In the end, however, we have to trust in the mystery of God's ways.

We are children of God, and we place ourselves in God's hands. As do those who make difficult choices about whether to migrate or to stay. Whatever happens, our communities are free to choose how to respond. Will our actions show that God's greatness cannot be measured?

begins in South Australia at 2.00am next Sunday (October 1) when clocks are put forward one hour.



LIVING THE WORD

The 'vineyard' in the Hebrew Scriptures always referred to Israel, the people of God, while the 'master' was God himself. This parable would have been clearly understood to be about being gathered into God's people and who was welcomed into the kingdom. The unbounded generosity of God is highlighted.

- In what ways are we able to offer generosity to new-comers in our parish or local area?
- What welcoming ministries exist in our parish for those who move into the area or for new migrants?
- Who are the people in our society who are in need of generosity and welcome?

DID YOU KNOW?

- In the Greco-Roman world, casual labourers used to gather in the agora or town-square waiting for employers to hire them.
- In the early Church there was sometimes a jealousy between those who had believed in the risen Christ from the earliest days and thus suffered persecution for their faith and those, especially Gentiles, who came to belief later on.

(Continued from page 1) At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'



HERE'S A TIP ABOUT GOD

"He replied to the one speaking for the rest, 'Friend, I haven't been unfair. We agreed on the wage of a dollar, didn't we? So take it and go. I decided to give to the one who came last the same as you. Can't I do what I want with my own money? Are you going to get stingy because I am generous?' Here it is again, the Great Reversal: many of the first ending up last, and the last first". (Matthew 20: 13 - 16)

When visiting Paris for the first time, I found one custom so different from here or other places I had visited that it made me genuinely uncomfortable: It was tipping. My guidebook told me not to tip the staff that cleaned my hotel room. They would take it as an insult that they were not doing their job well enough and needed further incentive. The same went for taxi drivers and to the infamous French waiters. An English-speaking waiter explained that the French do their job

and leave you to eat, not hovering around the table working for a larger tip. That is why we often consider them to be aloof or inattentive, when in fact they are neither.

We cannot possibly reach the standards of perfection we sometimes think God places on us. We fail to realise how generous God is with us. God's ways remain a mystery to us.

So we need merely to accept the generosity of God as God chooses to share it with us. We cannot work harder trying to impress God to get a bigger response from God who is already totally generous. We need instead to be accepting of what God chooses to give to us, grateful and humble.
